The Systemic Wedge: The Twin Obligations

Baseline: A Civil & Humane Society

- **Duty to Family:** Parents, wife, and children.
- **Duty to Nation:** People, community, and country.
- **Result:** A man fulfills both according to his inclinations.

Reality: Apartheid South Africa

- **The Attempt:** A man of color trying to live as a human being.
- **The Consequence:** Punished and isolated. Ripped from his home.
- **Result:** Forced to live a life apart—a twilight existence of secrecy and rebellion.

The Evolution of a Hunger

Stage 1: Boyhood (The Illusion)

Born free to run in fields, swim in streams, and roast mealies. Not troubled by the laws of man or God, so long as tribal customs were obeyed.

Stage 2: The Student (Transitory Freedom)

The desire for freedom only for oneself. The ability to stay out at night, read what one pleased, and go where one chose.

Stage 3: The Young Man (Honorable Freedom)

Yearning for basic rights in Johannesburg: achieving potential, earning a keep, marrying, and living a lawful life unobstructed.

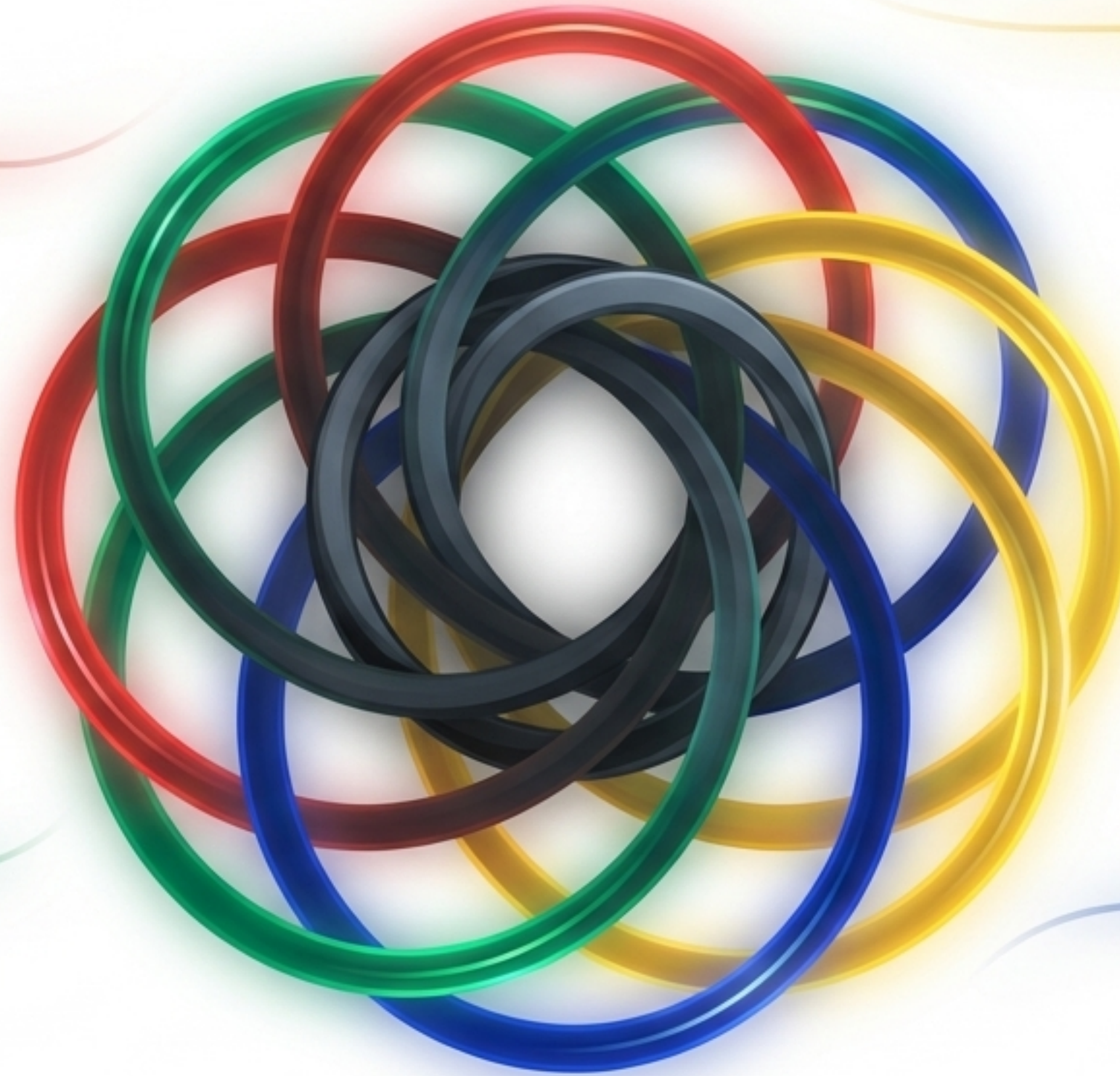
Stage 4: The Patriot (Indivisible Freedom)

The realization that freedom was curtailed for everyone who looked like him. The personal hunger transforms into a desire for the dignity and self-respect of an entire people.

The Ripple Effect of Oppression

Core Insight:

A law-abiding attorney is driven to become a criminal; a family-loving husband is turned into a man without a home. Enjoying limited, personal freedoms becomes impossible when an entire people is subjected to bondage.



The Conclusion:

“Freedom is indivisible; the chains on anyone of my people were the chains on all of them, the chains on all of my people were the chains on me.”

Stripped of bodily autonomy, political rights, and basic human dignity. Ripped from family. Robbed of freedom.

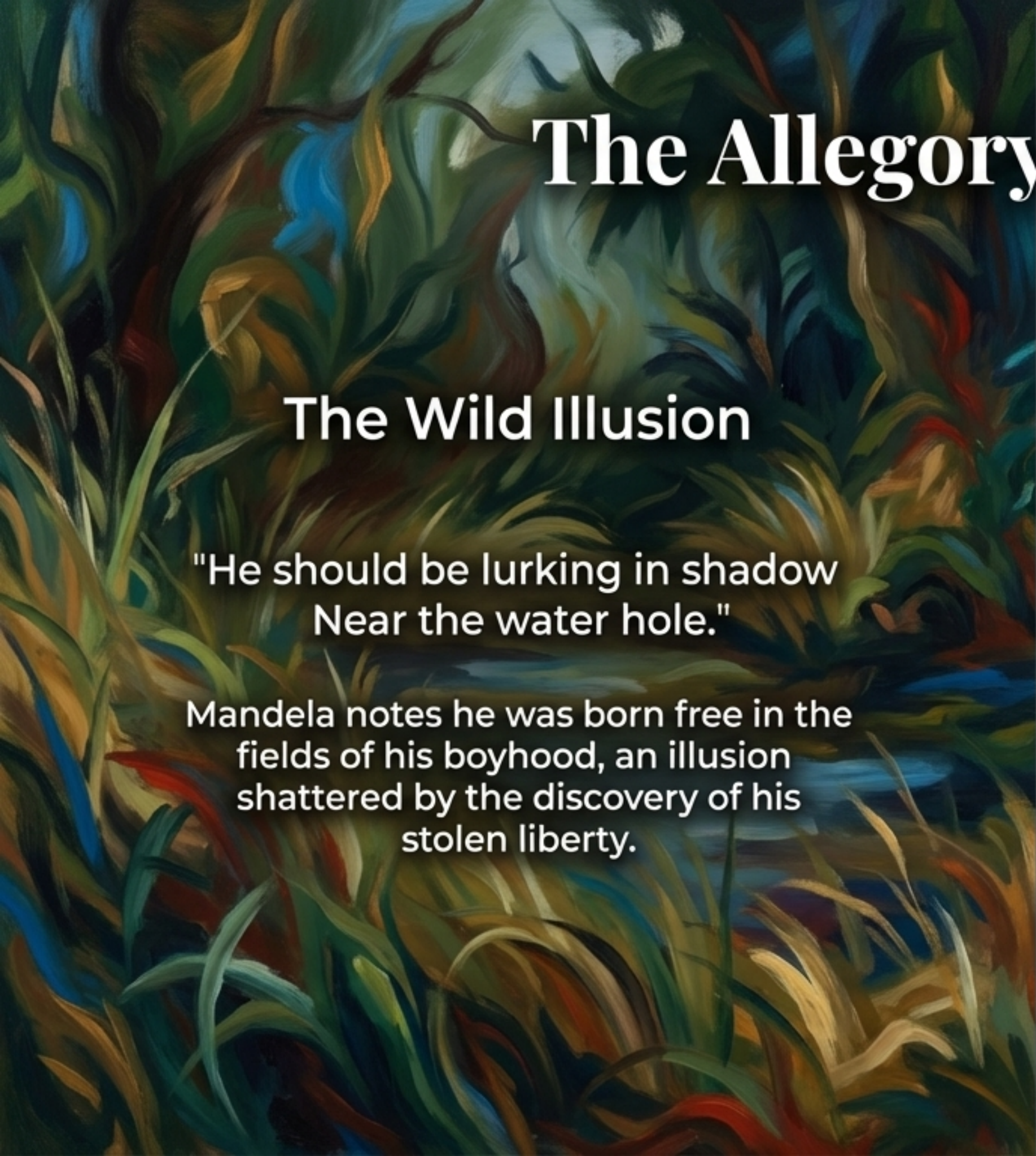


The Oppressor

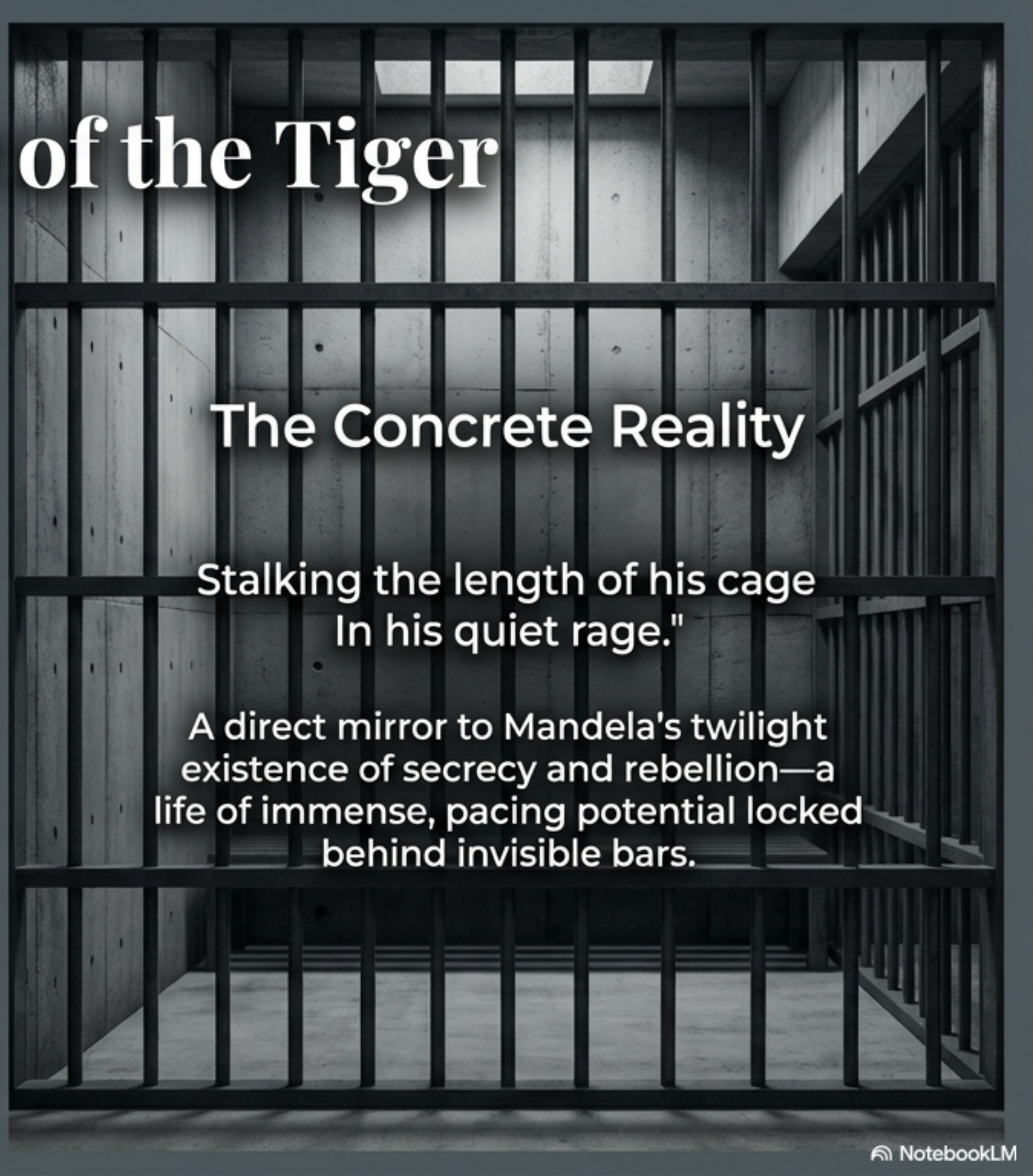


The Allegory of the Tiger

The Wild Illusion
